The meeting started with a viewing of Geoff Walker's video about a year in Thringstone. He had compiled this from video clips he had taken and still photographs, with commentary and music. Rose and Crown as a three storey building in the days when it was the Old Rose and Crown Inn

Viaduct with horse and cart passing through it

Nita will liaise with John Dickinson about getting A5 copies of these, and then get them mounted by the person Tam recommended at The Springboard Centre. The group can then work out how much these should sell for. Only a limited number of each print will be made to gauge interest.

I have attached the spreadsheet for future use and have reconciled the figures to the input data provided by Nita and the bank statements and cheque book. I can report that there are no outstanding invoices to be paid at this time and the accounts stand as recorded on the statement as £2,330.95 in credit.

Income £1313.91

Expenditure £1231.93

Credit balance for the year since June 2010 of £81.98

This does not seem good but I must remind you that without the East Midlands Airport and the RCC monies amounting to approx £400 this would mean a deficit of approx £300. We also have a banner now and still have some publications in stock.

Serious consideration is needed as to how to raise the income streams or alternatively to reduce the expenditure. There are potential costs (ie. Insurance ) and funds are likely to be eroded.

On a lighter note, thanks to Geoff Walker's help, we have found a cheaper source for printing the newsletter 4 times per year at Teamprint, giving us a saving on the previous price of £171.24 pa

Expenditure outstanding to Teamprint £31.50 – invoice not yet received.

We have had a good month for sales with thanks to Ann Petty for her efforts. We are now down to our last Memories I in general stock and so we need to decide whether to re-order or move to publishing these free on the web as stocks run out.

Since Ann has made such a sterling effort I have given her a small stock of her own and this is shown in the stock report below. I have checked with John Dickinson and he confirms he has no other stock and so this should represent the full picture.

There have been no sales at the George and Dragon or the Community Centre but a copy of Village Trail I has been stolen from the Community Centre.

£41.50 will be banked this month which includes a donation of £1.50.

The meeting agreed that no more should be printed and that current stock would be sold off. When they are gone the question of publishing on the internet will be considered, although Nita pointed out that we needed to remember not everybody had internet access and we had to consider all people, not just those with computers.

Ray Neal said with the added interest from English Heritage, sales of things of a history nature may well pick up again.

### History – Ann Petty



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The migration film project is now likely to go ahead on 25th February from 11am til 2.30pm. Ann has contacted most people who wish to be filmed and this will be done at Thringstone Members Club. There is a lot of paperwork attached to this project, and help may be needed in some aspects if people would like to volunteer.

As Nita reported, Nita and Ann went to meet with Alan Burgess to discuss various things, including the graveyard project, but he was detained elsewhere and missed the meeting. Following a good look round the graveyard, 32 graves out of the 147 on which there are details (provided by Ron Goacher) have been found, and Nita has roughly shown the location of these on a plan. These include people who were well known in their time for their work in the village or in some cases the public houses they kept, people who died in tragic circumstances from suicides to thypoid to pit accidents, and obviously Charles Booth and his family. Many graves have just totally disappeared.

Ann has also provided Nita with more information on the canal and other items of historical interest picked up from the Coalville Times.

In addition, Ann has agreed to attend a forthcoming Heritage Network Event organised by NWLDC and represent both FOGDP and FoT.

### **Councillors Report Ray Woodward/DaveEveritt**

- As reported before, there are still three major planning applications running (live) and to be determined. Due to unforeseen circumstances all have been delayed somewhat. The likelihood is that the hard standings for the works in the woods will go to committee on 8<sup>th</sup> Feb (next Tues), the post office in March and the Waldrum site hopefully will be determined by the planners. Any differences will be reported to the next meeting.
- The Fox site is subject to another application to build a Residential Nursing Home. A brief view by the planning officer appears to show something more in keeping with the area but a detailed study needs to be made before the councillors are made aware of the details of size, shape and materials to be used etc.
- There have been a number of tentative enquires about the Rose and Crown site and **IF** anything comes of these, we will report back to later meetings of this group.
- A 'problem' has been raised with regard to the Homestead Rd site. It **appears** that the buildings seem to be higher than planned, and we are currently liaising with planning enforcement officers to establish the ground levels, and whether or not these levels have been adhered to
- It seems that there are to be some alterations to Traffic Calming measures. The pedestrian crossing on The Green is to be raised on a speed table. The build out at Masons Chemists is to be replaced with a speed table. I feel we should approach the County Council again with a view to remove the build out at the bottom of L'boro' Road as this is far more dangerous than the aforementioned and the plans to build a 'Dolphin Nose' at the junction with the A512 and extend the 30mph limit would be sufficient. We will raise this again with the County Councillor (who was not at the meeting) and Highway Officers.
- All aspects of case work continues as necessary.
- Nita mentioned that the road to the new bungalows as part of the Miner's Welfare Development is to be known as Johnson Close in recognition of the work done by Walter Johnson, a previous councillor for Thringstone, father of our member Pam Spence and grandfather of our member Leon Spence. Ray was thanked for pursuing this for the family.

### **Police report**



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The Police were not at the meeting and had not sent a report. However, Nita reported that members may have heard that there is a new police website [www.police.uk](http://www.police.uk) into which you can type your postal code and find crime statistics for your area. Many people are reported in the press as being unhappy about this site, as it pinpoints various street names as crime hotspots, and could lead to a reduction in house values. Typing in LE67 8LT (Nita's post code) it comes up with current figures of 13 ASB reports, 6 violent crimes and 5 others. The area covered doesn't go into Whitwick, but shows a circular area around Thringstone going towards Osgathorpe and Swannington.

These stats are broken down to 1 violent crime in Tith Close area, 2 in Homestead Road area, 2 in Melrose Road area and one none defined. 13 ASBs are actually shown as 1 in Henson's Lane, 3 in Homestead Road, 3 on or near Springfield (probably Grace Dieu woods and relating to motorbikes), and 6 not defined. Others are 1 in Homestead Road, 2 in Melrose Road, 1 in Glebe Road and 1 in John Street.

### From Previous minutes

#### Gardening update

Bernard said that there was nothing to report as it was not the time of year for gardening. Janet said she had been offered some potted up Walnut trees if the group wanted them to sell at the summer event. This offer was accepted.

#### Litter pick s

An additional litter pick had been organised for 15<sup>th</sup> January as the village was looking very dirty after the bad weather and Christmas break. 15 bags of rubbish had been collected and Nita thanked everyone who had taken part. The next day on 16<sup>th</sup> January a working party of 6 had cleared the debris from the brook by the bridge by the back entrance to Grace Dieu manor. This had removed a large amount of rubbish and also been good fun.

#### Down to Earth (BBC Gardening programme) Recording - February 10<sup>th</sup> Methodist Church Hall

Arrangements for this are in hand. Questions have been allocated and questioners are asked to be seated on the front row at the very latest by 7.20pm.

Pam Porter and Pam Clayfield volunteered to run a raffle and Pam also agreed to see if people who weren't FoT members could be converted. Publicity details and a copy of The Bauble will be placed on each seat. Nita has already run these off. Nita will be at the hall from 6pm to set up chairs and tables with Tam and would appreciate help in ensuring that the car park area be kept clear for the BBC to park, and to ensure that things run smoothly. She will be interviewed before the recording about the work of Friends of Thringstone and in particular about the migration project to go out on Stephen Butt's Sunday afternoon history programme.

#### Publicity & Membership

Nita told the meeting about her efforts to publicise the group on Facebook and Twitter and reiterated the success in attracting new members this year. She also told about the response of a local resident who had been in the Hare & Hounds pub while the FoT committee were holding a meeting there. He had been asked if he knew about the group and what we did and if he would be willing to join. His response was that



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he would be willing to pay the subscription but did not want to be involved in any work. He also thought that the planting and litter picking should be done by the Council and asking people outright for money could be seen as 'another tax'. These are attitudes which we should bear in mind for the future when looking to attract new members. The full breadth of the work of the group needs to be borne in mind, not just environmental things.

#### Scarecrow Event

4<sup>th</sup> June 2011

Tam gave an update on arrangements for this event. He was going to the school on Friday 4<sup>th</sup> Feb with Nita to choose from the drawings the children had done which ones could be used as posters and hoped that the first poster would be up within the next 10 days. He will deliver straw during the week commencing 30<sup>th</sup> May or earlier if this can be arranged.

Payment of £3.50 must be given on delivery to non-members, with members being charged a discounted £3.

There will hopefully be prizes of £50, £25, & £10 for best scarecrows. The Brownies will choose the winners. Quizzes related to the scarecrows and a list of 'crows' with locations will be sold from the Green if we get permission from NWLDC to use this area, or failing that alongside the plant stall. It was felt that FoT as a group should have a scarecrow..

The cost of the quizzes will be Over 12s £2 and under 12s £1. These will be on sale between 11.00am and 2.00pm with the presentations at the Community Centre at around 3pm or maybe later to tie in with the activities for the Centenary Celebrations.

Geoff Walker said he could possibly either photograph or film the scarecrows.

Sponsorship is being sought to cover the prizes and there will also be a raffle.

Members were asked to tell any prospective sponsors that £25 would be acceptable. Ruby's have already offered sponsorship, the George and Dragon are giving a free meal for 4 and also having a scarecrow.

Nita will ask at the Business Breakfast at the George and Dragon which she will be attending about sponsorship and raffle prizes.

#### **AOB**

Charity bags -Roy Hill said that he had read in the Loughborough Echo that NWLDC had successfully prosecuted two unlicensed firms who were pushing plastic collection bags through doors and he wished to congratulate them.

Sponsorship - Ray Woodward said he had a contact at Caterpillar and was hopeful for a grant. He wanted to know what we would spend money on so that he could give them specific project ideas which needed money. It was felt seasonal planting was too vague and it would be better to ask for money for tools.

Leon Spence said that money was probably available in the form of a small grant for a village appraisal which, if done and collated, could provide more concrete information on the needs of the village and provide a platform from which to move forward. Nita will investigate this further.
